General Education. English Composition II and Business Ethics are strongly recommended in the first semester. The other General Education requirements may be taken in any sequence.

Major. Business (BUS) courses are offered in the Fall and Spring semesters and may be taken in any order. BUS415 and BUS450 should be taken in the semesters shown below. Accounting (ACC) 240 is offered in the Fall semester; ACC241 is offered in the Spring.

\*Students completing the General option of Linn State’s MIS Specialist program will have different requirements at WWU than those who complete the Accounting option.

**Summer**

Students may take up to seven hours in the William Woods summer session, which begins the Monday after the spring semester ends in May. Online and face-to-face courses are offered. The summer schedule is available before fall registration begins in late March and typically includes multiple General Education courses and some major requirements.

You may take courses elsewhere during the summer and transfer them back to WWU. Up to 70 hours from community colleges (and 90 hours total) may be accepted in transfer toward a WWU degree. If you plan on taking summer courses elsewhere, please note the following:

1. Contacting the Registrar’s office before you register for summer courses will let you know how those courses would transfer.
2. Your final 30 credits must be taken at William Woods to satisfy the university’s residency requirement.
3. Most financial aid packages pertain to single institutions, so you are unlikely to receive that aid for summer courses elsewhere. Check with Student Financial Services for details.

### General Education

A list of remaining General Education courses for students with a completed AAS follows. General Education courses are designated in the WWU catalog by single-letter designations following the course title. Those designations are listed below in parenthesis next to the categories. A general category description is beneath the category names. The credits required in each category are on the right.

Communication (“C”)

ENG102 English Composition II 3 cr

Creative and Aesthetic Sensibility (“A”) 3 cr

Typically a 100- or 200-level course in Art (ART), Music (MUS) or Theatre (THA)

Critical Thinking (“T”) 3 cr

Typically a 100- or 200-level course in Humanities (HUM) or Philosophy (PHL)

Cultural Diversity (“D”) 3 cr

100- or 200-level courses throughout the university curriculum in language, geography, religion and culture

Historical Perspective (“H”) 3 cr

Typically a 100- or 200-level course in history (HIS)

Linn State courses meeting this requirement:

HST105 American History to 1877; HST110 American History 1877-present. Use one of

these courses to meet LSTC's Social Science requirement.

Meaning ("L")

Typically a 100- or 200-level English (ENG) course in literature or in film studies
